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The postsecondary PREPARATION CYCLE

GRADE 12

After attending presentations and information sessions, students will have gathered materials from Laurentian that list the admission requirements for their program(s) of interest. You may want to offer to review your student's course registration for all 4U/M courses or equivalents, ensuring they will be taking the prerequisite courses required for their program(s) of choice.

Please note: Once students have applied to Laurentian, they should be monitoring their my.laurentian.ca portal account regularly.

What is the my.laurentian.ca Portal?
The my.laurentian.ca portal is an online resource for those applicants who have applied for admission. It allows applicants to interact with the Office of Admissions, to access any supplemental forms required to process their application, to apply for a spot in residence, to receive information on fees, scholarships and bursaries, and more.

DECEMBER 2024

Prior to the second semester in this final year of high school, students should review their courses to ensure they are on track for graduation and with the prerequisites for their program(s) of interest. Your student may need to retake a course in which they were not successful during their previous studies or add a course to apply for a new program of choice. Speaking with their guidance office will help them determine which classes can be taken in the second semester.

Please note: Students may receive early offers of admission prior to the new year (except Architecture).

What is an early conditional offer?
Students may receive an early conditional offer of admission in the fall, based on their grade 11 average. The final decision will depend upon their best six grade 12 U or M courses, successful completion of the required courses and the obtention of the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD).



SPRING 2025

By early spring, eligible applicants will have received conditional offers. Be sure to encourage your student to continue working hard in their studies as offers can be rescinded if the average entry requirement for their program of choice is not maintained.

END OF THE SECONDARY SCHOOL YEAR

Students who have applied to an open enrollment program at Laurentian and have received a conditional offer can take summer high school courses that count toward their admission average.

How to help your student SELECT A PROGRAM

Selecting a postsecondary program is one of the most important decisions your student will make on their journey towards a great career. Though the decision is personal and unique to each student's career goals, we've created a conversation tool to assist you in guiding your student through the decision-making process.

DEGREE CUSTOMIZATION

Building and customizing their degree to include unique and/or complementary subject combinations can give your student an advantage in the workforce.

We make it easy for your student to pair subjects they are passionate about while setting them off on a path to a rewarding and fulfilling career. Embarking on a journey that combines their aptitudes and interests is the best way to ensure they are passionate about their future career. Each program has a certain number of required specialized courses that must be taken in order to successfully complete the program of study. Electives are courses that allow your student to explore other areas of interest that can expand your career options. Your student can group electives into one field of study to enhance and/or complement their degree, thus creating minors, concentrations, and majors.

The chart above reflects the average number of credits required to complete the customized degree option. Other combinations are possible. Please refer to each program for specific program requirements. Note: Laurentian typically offers 3-credit (semester long) and 6-credit (fall and winter semesters) courses.

Your student should consider their options and how their study path can allow them to create a niche for themselves in the workforce or take them exactly where they want to go. This path starts at the undergraduate level and can lead directly to the workforce, to graduate studies, or to professional schools.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

At Laurentian, we recognize that experience is essential to the success of our graduates entering the workforce. Experiential learning opportunities for students are available in the form of enhanced leadership development, entrepreneurship and applied learning in varied settings to enhance their skill sets.

The Foundry – The Foundry is an innovation, entrepreneurship and leadership development program located within the spacious Jim Fielding Innovation and Commercialization Space at Laurentian. The Centre aims to support Laurentian students, staff, faculty, and alumni as they strive to develop innovative, creative, and professional skill sets and launch entrepreneurial ventures on campus. In addition to open collaborative spaces and dedicated meeting rooms, users also have access to a Makerspace facility with 3D printers, SOLIDWORKS® as well as other design software, a CNC Mill and laser cutter for training and product development purposes. Co-op Experience – This extensive work-integrated learning experience offers students a chance to gain a full year of paid employment to complement their academic studies. Programs offering co-ops include: Architecture, Computer Science, Engineering (Chemical, Mining and Mechanical streams), Sciences (Specializations in Chemistry, Biochemistry, Pharmaceutical Chemistry and Biochimie).

Internships – Internships pair students with employers to complete placements that vary in length depending on the program. The format provides students with a chance to work in a professional environment and gain valuable experience while often leading to full-time employment opportunities following graduation.



How does experiential learning enhance your student’s in-class education?

APPLYING FOR ADMISSION



Applying to Laurentian is relatively simple and our staff is here to offer help should your student require it. Whether your student has questions relating to program requirements, deadlines, or even transferring credits from prior learning experiences, our team is available, ready and willing to assist.

1. CHECK PROGRAM ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Admission criteria and supplemental documentation requirements can be found on our website at laurentian.ca/undergraduate-programs for each individual program. It is important that your student review these before applying.

2. APPLY ONLINE

To be admitted for full-time studies to an Ontario university, students must apply online through the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC) at ouac.on.ca.

3. RECEIVE AN ACKNOWLEDGEMENT EMAIL

Once your student has applied, they will receive an important email from Laurentian's Office of Admissions with information on accessing their my.laurentian.ca portal. They should receive this email within two business days of submitting their application to OUAC.

4. ACCESSING THEIR PROFILE ON

my.laurentian.ca

Once your student is being considered for admission to Laurentian, there will be a waiting period during which the Office of Admissions is reviewing grades and requirements. During this time, it is recommended that applicants access their my.laurentian.ca profile to ensure that they are aware of any supplemental information required for their application.

What is a my.laurentian.ca profile? Your student's my.laurentian.ca profile is an online resource for applicants. It allows them to interact with the Office of Admissions, submit documents, to access any supplemental forms required to process your application, to apply for a spot in residence, to receive information on fees, scholarships and bursaries, and much more! Students can access their profile at my.laurentian.ca.



5. APPLY FOR SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

Applicants can explore the numerous scholarship and bursary opportunities available to them on their my.laurentian.ca profile. The deadline to apply for scholarships and bursaries is March 3rd, 2025.

Missed the deadline? The Laurentian Academic Excellence Scholarship is automatically awarded to all students who meet the criteria. New bursary applications are also sent out to students via their student portal every semester.

6. APPLY FOR RESIDENCE

Did you know students can apply for residence before they receive an offer? At Laurentian, first-year high school applicants are guaranteed a spot in a residence when they apply to University College or Single Student Residences before June 2, 2025. The application information is available on your student's my.laurentian.ca profile.

7. ACCEPTING AN OFFER OF ADMISSION

If your student has received an offer from Laurentian, the decision letter will be posted in the Documents folder on their my.laurentian.ca profile. Applicants must carefully review the details and conditions of their offer. To accept the offer, applicants must visit ouac.on.ca, log into their account, and follow the instructions to accept. OUAC will send their response to our Office of Admissions.

Early Conditional Offers: Your student may receive an early conditional offer of admission in the fall, based on their Grade 11 average. The final decision will depend upon their best six Grade 12 U or M courses, successful completion of the required courses and the obtention of the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD).

Alternate Offers: Your student may receive an alternate offer from our Office of Admissions. Applicants must take the time to review the offer and learn more about the suggested program(s) by consulting our website or speaking with one of our Liaison staff. Should your student wish to be considered for an alternate open-enrolment program offered at Laurentian, they must contact the Office of Admissions at admissions@laurentian.ca.

While Liaison's team of friendly guides will customize your visit to include all the highlights and features of campus and program(s) of interest, we encourage you and your student to prepare and ask questions throughout the process to maximize your visit.

Before your campus visit:

- ▶ Request a meeting with a faculty member from your student's program(s) of choice.
- ▶ Request a meeting with a service representative to discuss any special accommodations your student may require.
- ▶ To best experience university life, we encourage you to spend a night or two exploring the city and the campus.

During your visit:

- ▶ Take the time to note extracurricular areas and imagine how your student will enhance their time at Laurentian.
- ▶ Encourage them to ask about clubs, teams, intramurals, and volunteer opportunities.

- ▶ Ask if your student's program(s) of interest offer(s) the ability for co-op or experiential learning.
- ▶ Ask if your student's program(s) of interest offer(s) degree flexibility to allow for double majors, minors, etc.
- ▶ We recommend taking pictures of the facilities, including residence, to capture highlights of your visit.

Glossary of terms

3-CREDIT COURSES – Courses that run for a single semester (i.e. September to December or January to April)

6-CREDIT COURSES – Courses that run for a full academic year (i.e.: September to April)

UNDERGRADUATE STUDIES – Studies at the postsecondary level, typically for the achievement of a bachelor's degree.

GRADUATE STUDIES – Studies at the post-undergraduate level, typically for the achievement of a master's or doctoral degree.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE – An undergraduate program that covers a major area of study and that typically takes four years to complete.

MASTER'S DEGREE – A graduate level program that follows the undergraduate degree and focuses on a particular area within a field of study. Typically, this one to two-year program consists of a thesis or capstone project.

DOCTORAL DEGREE – The most advanced degree that symbolizes the mastery of a specific area of study or field of profession, it involves a major research project or dissertation. It typically takes several years to complete.

CERTIFICATE – Requires 30 credits within a distinct field of study.

CONCENTRATION – A way of enhancing your degree by selecting a group of courses that are thematically related and requires a minimum of 36 credits within a distinct field of study.

MAJOR – Indicates a specialization by completing a minimum of 42 credits concentrated on one specific field of study.

MINOR – Indicates a small area of concentration by completing a minimum of 24 credits in a specific field of study.

SPECIALIZATION – Indicates a higher degree of specialization in a subject area by completing a minimum of 60 credits concentrated on one specific field of study.

SCHOLARSHIP – Awarded to students based on academic and/or personal merit.

BURSARY – Awarded to students based on a combination of academic and/or personal achievements as well as financial need.

ONTARIO STUDENT ASSISTANCE PLAN (OSAP) – A financial aid program that assists students in funding their education costs through grant and student loan opportunities.

OSAP GRANT – Funding students are not required to repay

OSAP STUDENT LOAN – A temporary loan that must be repaid once postsecondary studies are completed.
